

The Pre-Board Exams for both Grade X ICSE and Grade XII ISC were held, and answer sheets were distributed to provide students with detailed feedback on their performance. Following this, a Parent-Teacher Meeting was conducted to discuss students' results, offer a general assessment of their progress, and provide recommendations for further development.

After the Pre-Boards, special classes were organized for Grade X ICSE students to provide last-minute revisions. Teachers focused on key topics and important notes to ensure students were well-prepared for the upcoming exams. In addition, Grade XII students worked diligently on their Internal Assessments and project work. Anchoring Bias: Insights from Tversky and Kahneman

To investigate the impact of anchoring bias, a study divided high school students into two groups. One group

was presented with a mathematical sequence starting with a low number (1), while the other began with a higher number (8). Participants were asked to estimate the final product of the sequence. The results revealed that the initial number significantly influenced the final estimates. Those who started with a lower number consistently underestimated the correct answer, while those who began with a higher number overestimated it. This study highlights the powerful effect of anchoring bias, demonstrating how initial information can sway judgment, even in seemingly objective tasks.

From The Counsellor's Desk

At Scottish High International School, we believe in fostering holistic growth for both students and staff. This month, our sessions have been instrumental in enhancing students' emotional intelligence, practical skills, and overall well-being. Additionally, our counseling team has been actively engaged in



providing support to students, equipping them with the tools necessary to navigate their academic and personal lives with confidence and resilience.

GD Goenka University hosted a workshop on Emotional Intelligence, Leadership, and Employee Well-being. It brought together educators and leaders to emphasize the role of emotional intelligence in leadership and fostering workplace well-being. Representing Scottish High International School was the Counseling Department. The sessions focused on the core components of emotional intelligence—Self-awareness, Self-regulation, Empathy, and Social Skills—and their impact on effective leadership. Activities like Emotional Awareness Meditation and Decoding Emotions helped participants explore emotional cues and leadership traits such as teamwork and resilience. Speakers Dr. Preeti Malhotra and Dr. Swati Sisodia underscored the importance of emotional regulation, open communication, and mindfulness in creating supportive work environments. Key takeaways included strategies to align personal and organizational goals, promote well-being, and enhance leadership effectiveness. The workshop concluded with valuable insights and practical tools, leaving participants inspired to foster emotional intelligence and well-being within their organizations.

Continuing the emphasis on emotional and physical well-being, an insightful Sex and Health Education Workshop was held for the students of Grade X, XI, and XII at Scottish High International School by Pratisandhi Foundation, a non-profit organization dedicated to de-stigmatizing sexuality education. The session, led by Ms. Anisha Hallan, Mr. Aryaman Singh, Ms. Riya Srivastava, and Mr. Ronit Sharma, focused on key topics such as sexual health, consent, pornography, and addiction.

Simultaneously, Ms. Priyamvada attended the School Counselors, Agents, UK HEIs Engagement Meet with UCAS at the British Council, New Delhi. The event provided valuable updates on the UK higher education admissions process and offered professional development for counselors. Key highlights included the significant increase in demand for UK higher education, with applications from India more than doubling since 2019. The session also addressed how to support academically strong students facing financial challenges. The insights gained from this session will directly enhance the guidance we provide our students at Scottish High International School as they plan their future studies in the UK.

The focus on comprehensive education extended further with a dedicated expert talk for Grade VII on the topic of Menstruation. The session comprehensively covered vital aspects such as anatomy, the concept of menstruation, the phases of the menstrual cycle, and the importance of menstrual hygiene.

The sensitive subject matter was presented thoughtfully, encouraging a comfortable and open dialogue. Students were encouraged to ask questions, fostering an environment of trust and understanding.

Meanwhile, Grade VI students participated in several valuable expert sessions designed to build both emotional intelligence and practical life skills. They began the month with a session on "Knowing Your Triggers: Anger Management," where they learned to recognize the triggers and physical cues that accompany anger. This was followed by a session on "Anger Management: Practical Strategies," where students were introduced to helpful techniques such as relaxation methods, distraction, and communication skills for managing anger. These sessions equipped students with practical tools to manage their emotions in a constructive way.

A session on Puberty was also conducted, focusing on helping students navigate the physical and emotional changes they experience during this stage of life. Topics such as hormonal changes, emotional regulation, and self-care were discussed. The session emphasized the importance of embracing these changes as a natural part of growth. Students actively participated in the discussion, asking questions and sharing their concerns, which were addressed with care.

Additionally, students engaged in an expert talk on "Introduction to Art Therapy." The differences between thoughts, emotions, habits, and behaviors, their interlinkages, and common misconceptions about emotions were discussed. The benefits of art therapy—such as its role in emotional release, self-awareness, and problem-solving—were highlighted through an engaging video on Bhargavii Mani's Kolampodu success story and a hands-on activity where students created mood mandalas using colors to represent emotions. This emphasized its role in emotional regulation, focus, and cognitive flexibility.

To build further practical skills, students participated in a First

Aid workshop conducted by SHARP NGO, where they learned how to handle common injuries like cuts, scrapes, burns, and nosebleeds. Students also participated in sessions on Renewable Energy, exploring the importance of renewable resources for environmental sustainability through comic strips. Another session on The Evidence of Evolution provided insights into human evolution, developmental stages, and the significance of early civilizations like the Sumerian language. For Grade VII, the focus shifted to emotional development, relationships, and communication skills. A key session on Attachment Styles explored the four main types of attachment—secure, anxious, avoidant, and disorganized—and their impact on relationships, enhanced by a video titled "What Your Attachment Style Says About Your Personality." Another session, "Knowing Your Triggers: Anger Management," built on their understanding of anger and aggression, including common triggers and physical manifestations. This was further developed through a follow-up session, "Anger Management: Practical Strategies," where practical tips such as relaxation

In addition, a session on Healthy Relationships and Communication introduced students to the PEACE acronym (Pause, Empathize, Address feelings, Compromise, Explore solutions), providing tools for resolving conflicts with respect and empathy. The importance of emotional expression was further explored in an Art Therapy session with Ms. Jyoti Sharma, where students were encouraged to use art as a safe outlet for feelings.

techniques, movement, and communication strategies were

discussed.

Lastly, for Grade VIII, a Counselor's Talk on Imbibing Clan Spirit was held during clan time, highlighting participation, clan values, and fostering teamwork. This session reinforced the sense of community and healthy competition among students.

These expert talks and workshops continue to enrich the lives of our students, providing them with the necessary skills, knowledge, and awareness to navigate the challenges of adolescence and beyond. We look forward to more such impactful sessions in the coming months.


Diwali: A Festival of Light and Economic Prosperity in India



Koodiyattam Cultural Event



"Indian culture is a treasure trove of wisdom, where art becomes a medium to convey profound messages and evoke emotions."

Scottish High has always emphasized that the goal of education is to develop well-rounded individuals who possess a spirit of inquiry and appreciation for the arts. To pursue this goal, the school organized a cultural event for students in Grades III, VI, VII, and VIII on December 10, 2024, in association with SPIC MACAY.(SPIC MACAY stands for the Society for the Promotion of Indian Classical Music and Culture Among Youth).

The event was honored by the presence of our esteemed School Principal, Dr. Sanjay Sachdeva, the Primary School Director, Ms. Seema Bhati, and world-renowned performers of the ancient art form of Koodiyattam.

The event began with Dr. Indu explaining the art of Koodiyattam, a 2,000-year-old Sanskrit theatre tradition, along with the main expressions and gestures used in this art form. Koodiyattam is considered the oldest surviving Sanskrit theater tradition in the world. She was assisted by a talented team of musicians: Kalamandalam Manikandan, Nepathya Jinesh, Kalanilayam Rajan, and Kalanilayam Sreejit Sundaran. Dr. Indu engaged with the enthusiastic students, inviting them to guess the expressions and hand

gestures demonstrated. Following this, the master performer Margi Madhu, a Chakyar who has dedicated 44 years to the art of Koodiyattam, narrated a "Balacharitham" in an elaborate costume. He is the son of the renowned Koodiyattam artist Padma Shree Moozhikkulam Kochukuttan Chakyar, and the nephew of Padma Bhushan Ammannoor Madhavava Chakyar, from whom he learned this ancient art form. Margi Madhu has been recognized with numerous national and international awards, including the KALA Puraskaram from London in 2013 and the Sangeet Natak Akademi Awards in 2022. He has performed on many prestigious national and international stages, notably showcasing his talent at the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C. and to the international jury of UNESCO. 

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

ANITYA'S TIP OF THE MONTH

Make a full turn for a powerful back swing

Over the last few articles, we have covered a good grip and a set up that all golfers should adopt. This gets them to hold the club correctly as well as get into a balanced position as they take their posture on the golf ball. The next step from here is to make a proper turn in the back swing and load up on to the right leg so that the down swing and through can be initiated in proper sequence.

The photograph shows me in a top of the back swing position wherein my body is fully coiled up and is ready to start the down swing into the golf ball. The best way to achieve this to make sure that you turn your hips and chest away from the target and that the weight goes on to the right leg. This helps in creating a powerful turn on the way back which in turn encourages you to strike the ball correctly.



You should look to check the following in the ideal top of the back swing position:

- → Shoulders and hips are turned with the chest facing away from the target
- → Wrists are hinged at the top of the back swing and are to the right side of the head
- → Weight is favoring the right leg and the body is ready to uncoil towards the target

Practice in front of a mirror to take a feedback on how the body is coiling to the top of the back swing. Set up correctly on the golf ball and load up well on to the right leg and you're well on your way to becoming a good ball striker
